From Pastor Carolyn:

When we moved to our home in Hopkinton 18 years ago, we inherited a number of perennial gardens scattered throughout the property. They take more tending than I really have time for, although I enjoy the time I take to tend them! One recent summer, in an attempt to control the chaos and give the illusion of order, I spent many an hour lining them with a brick border. The idea was to keep the grass of the lawn from invading the gardens and to keep the flowers within their boundary.

This time of year I can't help but notice which flowers did not survive the winter. I was particularly disappointed to see that one of my favorites, the bright red bee balm, was missing. Then, I saw it. Growing proudly outside of my neat brick border, intermingled with the grass in the lawn, several plants were staging a comeback. They had escaped the careful boundary I had created for them to keep them safe and protected from the lawnmower. Here was my conundrum. I could replant them where they belonged, possibly killing them off in the transfer process (I am not much of a green thumb), or I could leave them where they were scattered, exposing them to almost certain death by mowing. As I pondered the options, I wondered why the bee balm was foolish enough to circumvent the safe haven I had provided for it, and instead seek out the forbidden pleasure of the lawn.

But isn't that the age old human dilemma? How do you, as a child of God, make your decisions about the acceptable limits of your behavior? To be a Christian today means to be part of the counter-culture; it means to constantly make choices based on the life and teachings of Christ, his death and victorious resurrection. Most people living in our society have some idea as to what God expects of them; the vast majority chooses to disregard what they know.

As you enjoy the beautiful flowers coming forth at this time of year, I hope they

may remind you that we all make choices each and every day regarding what is "in bounds" and what is "out of bounds." May God's guidance steer us to make choices that honor and glorify our God.

An Update on Our Search

During the month of May 2007, the Pastoral Search Committee has been hard at work on the church history update. The members of the committee would like to thank you for taking the time to send in your memories or stick a "Post-it Note" on the history boards in the sanctuary. Your help in this process is extremely appreciated and will assist us in the finishing touches of the historical update.

Why does this process take so long? This is one of the many questions members of the committee have been asked by members of the church. This is a fair question, and the committee would like to shed a bit of light on the process. A few months ago, with help from the NH Conference, the committee discussed the recommended procedure which is used prior to advertising our open pastoral position. The entire process is extremely thorough and requires us to document where the church has been, what the church has done, and what the church will be in the future. That being said, good things take time! We think a good rule of thumb may be to say that for every year the prior Pastor served, it will take a month of time for the search committee to finish the required work. Although this is not concrete, nor a science, it gives us a good idea that the process could take no less than 16 months at best, and up to 24 months or more, depending on circumstances.

The committee has several current goals for projects that are scheduled:

~ History Project—currently a work in progress and should be finished sometime in early fall 2007.

~ Member Survey—currently a work in progress and will be sent out sometime in the near future. Responses and data collected from the survey will help the committee form a church profile. Project scheduled for completion sometime in early fall 2007.

~ Brochure—pictures, events, and contents are currently being reviewed and discussed within the committee. This brochure will be sent to possible candidates who re-

quest information about us.

~ Church Profile—currently a work in progress as the committee works on survey questions, demographic data, and financial data. This project should be finished sometime in early fall 2007.

The finished products will be sent to the NH Conference as part of the search process and the committee will move on to the next search phase. Thanks to all for your enthusiastic support so far on the history project and we look forward to updating you in the near future of the progress made by the committee.

The project is complicated and extremely time consuming; however, the organ will still remain in operation during the project. Certain portions of the organ will be shut down in order to commence work to that section while the

rest of the organ remains intact for church use. The Music Committee plans on beginning the work this coming fall. 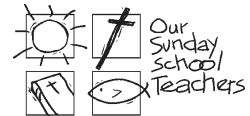

The NH Conference, UCC will sponsor a chartered bus trip to Synod in the City, the day-long gala celebration of the UCC's 50th anniversary, taking place on **Saturday, June 23**, in Hartford, Connecticut, as part of the 26th General Synod.

The day begins with worship at 8:30 a.m. at the Hartford Civic Center and a keynote address by Bill Moyers. Other presenters will offer distinctive insights into our mission as a multicultural, multiracial, open and affirming, accessible to all, just peace church. In addition, the national UCC office has just announced that active UCC member U.S. Senator Barack Obama (D-IL) will be a featured afternoon speaker. 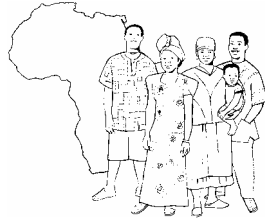

More Sagas from the Thrift Shop

Have you ever been to Africa? One hot spring morning, while sitting at my desk, I spun around to look out at our lilac bush. My mind flew back 20 years to Morocco, where I had often traveled to be with my daughter, Linda, while she and her husband were stationed there in the German Embassy. Blinking rapidly, I saw a single file of African women walking past to the lawns behind Manning House, dressed brilliantly in multi-colored gowns, walking proudly with their heads wrapped high with what looked like turbans. I dashed to the opposite window as they stopped suddenly, looking quiet and serious.

A little later, into the shop came a state worker to discuss the situation with me. Remember, as I have told you, the variety in that small shop is indeed the spice of our lives. The woman informed me they were Somalians, refugees sent here at the rate of 50 per month. They were crowded into two-room apartments by our city fathers. She pointed out two women with eight children total, now living in two rooms with almost no furnishings. Could we help them? Of course!

Into the shop came about eight women, looking scared (of little old me, yet!). I thought they needed American clothing – WRONG! They were on our land because our church had granted them a section of garden so they could plant vegetables to eat. I instructed the interpreter to tell them that they could have anything in the shop they needed. My co-workers, aghast, didn't know how to cope for that one day; everything was free! The Somalian women took sheets, laid them on the floor and piled on every pot, pan and mug, etc. they could find.

Memories returned, for I saw that shopping method in the marketplace (sooks) in Africa. When the shelves were empty, they proceeded to wrap their new possessions in the sheets and put these huge bundles on top of their heads. Smoothly they glided,

necks stiff, to a waiting car. Not one thing fell to the ground.

Then, we noticed one woman left behind. There was no room for her, what with all the bundles. The social worker appeared and said the African lived on Brook Street, and someone would come for her. We all waited for an hour, but no one came. We were hot and thirsty inside and she was out in the hot sun. There was iced tea in our little fridge, so we took a big glassful to her. No one needed a common language; we saw the gratitude in her eyes and the only smile seen that day. When she had drained the glass, she rose, put her bundle on top of her head and walked off towards Brook Street. These women came every Friday to work in the fields harvesting huge crops and they were proud, and so were we.

Flash forward to another small story. On a recent Saturday, little children trooped into the shop, off and on. We knew they would show up, from past experience. We keep little chairs next to a low shelf of colorful kids' books, etc. They sit and read while their parents shop. But it was the day before Mother's Day and most had a one-dollar bill clutched in their hands. They were looking for gifts for their Moms, and they averaged about six years old. The adults stayed outside; the little ones came to the desk holding up various little gifts, maybe a piece of costume jewelry or a pretty scarf. Whatever the real price, usually much higher, I told them their purchase was one dollar. Those children were not looking for toys for themselves that day. The last one spotted a big yellow pin with the imprint "World's Best Mom" on it. "How much is it?" she asked. I knew she had spent her dollar, so I replied, "It is only 25 cents."

"That is just what I have left," she beamed.

I am sure there were proud Moms that Sunday and we were proud of the mothers, because it certainly showed that they are bringing up their children to think of others before themselves.
